The Traverse is delighted to announce its programme for TravFest 2024. A bold, exciting, entertaining and timely selection of new work, curated alongside hits from world-leading writers, comedians, actors and musicians taking to the stage from Thursday 25 July to Sunday 25 August.

Voices from Scotland, England, Palestine, Australia, Iran, the USA, and Ireland bring pressing stories of now from around the world. Stories of community, war, forbidden love, belonging, football, mental health, family, and LGBTQIA+ experiences that will fill hearts, minds and the Traverse's stages this summer. TravFest 2024 is packed with stories that will touch everyone, and are as urgent and important as they are captivating.

Making its World Premiere on the Traverse 1 stage, the Traverse Theatre Company is proud to present **So Young by Douglas Maxwell**, in co-production with Raw Material and Citizens Theatre. A notable name on the Scottish stage with hits like **Decky Does A Bronco** and previous Traverse commission **I Can Go Anywhere**, this touching and funny new play explores the challenges of middle age, shifting friendships, and the impact of losing those close to us. So Young will be brought to life by direction from Traverse Artistic Director **Gareth Nicholls**.

Back for extra time after a critically-acclaimed run in December 2023, *Same Team*, by Robbie Gordon and Jack Nurse created with Street Soccer's Women Players, makes its way back into Traverse 1 ready to delight audiences all over again, directed by Bryony Shanahan. Co-created through workshops that wove a tapestry of real women's experiences into each of the characters, *Same Team* shines a light on the daily social and economic challenges faced by many in Scotland – and across the world – demonstrating the immense power of community in bringing us together to overcome adversity.

Following the success of last year's TravFest hit *No Love Songs*, Dundee Rep Theatre returns in coproduction with the Traverse with the World Premiere of *A History of Paper*, a new play by Oliver **Emanuel and Gareth Williams, directed by Andrew Panton**. Originally developed as an award-winning radio drama for the BBC Radio 4, the play has blossomed into a tender, uplifting musical love-story about the little bits of paper that make up life, and arrives on the Traverse 2 stage following Oliver Emanuel's passing in late 2023.

Traverse Theatre joins forces in co-production with Soho Theatre to bring the World Premiere of *My English Persian Kitchen* by Hannah Khalil, based on the story by Atoosa Sepehr and directed by Chris White, to Traverse 2. Utilising live cooking on stage, one woman creates the dishes of her homeland whilst building a new life and community around food. Soho Theatre also present Edinburgh Comedy Award-Winner, Natalie Palamides, in a regular late-night slot in Traverse 1 with her new show WEER, an achingly tender 90s rom-drom (romantic dramedy) that asks you to look at every argument from two sides.

Riding the tide of waves made in Australia, Roast Productions brings a brand-new production of Virginia Gay's gender-flipped retelling of Cyrano as it makes its European premiere in Traverse 1, directed by Clare Watson. Leah Shelton's wildly theatrical and deeply intimate story of female madness, **BATSHIT** directed by **Ursula Martinez** and produced by **Quiet Riot**, also transfers from Australia having been described as 'moving, thought provoking and terrific fun' by The Age.

Four-time Scotsman Fringe First and Olivier award-winning **Fishamble** return to TravFest following a sell-out TravFest 2023 run with *Heaven*, presenting the UK premiere of **Joanne Ryan**'s *In Two Minds* which explores the humour, pain and tenderness within a mother-daughter relationship. Also making their grand return to TravFest stages are **Cusack Projects Ltd** with **Half Moon Street Ltd**, bringing the UK premiere of six-time Tony Award nominated *The Sound Inside* by Adam Rapp, directed by Matt **Wilkinson**.

Traverse 2 will also be home to the World Premiere of *A Knock On The Roof* by Khawla Ibraheem. Directed and developed by Oliver Butler, for the final two weeks of August ahead of an Off-Broadway run in early 2025. Performed by Khawla, this is a heart-breaking, gripping, and surprisingly comedic solo show depicting the realities of those living in Gaza during these fractured times, produced by piece by piece productions.

Bringing young voices to the festival programme once again, the Traverse presents *Letters To Our Future Government* – a public call-out to those aged 16-25 to create rapid-response for short plays and work of creative writing for performance. Asking "Given the opportunity, what would you say to those in charge – or who are about to be?" – this limited week-long series will be sure to shed a light on our ever-changing world. Full details of call-out will be announced in early June.

Completing the festival programme will be a series of Monday events with partners from across the creative industries, including the **Society of Scottish Playwrights** and **Playwrights Studio Scotland** – who also return with their bookshop. There will be a special launch event for the Traverse and Wonder Fools project **Positive Stories for Negative Times Season 4**, and a unique meet-up event for creatives working in all things immersive, spanning theatre, games, escape rooms, TV, film and more.

TravFest 2024 marks the third year running that every production within the programme is taking part within our £1 Tickets Project. This means that there is an allocation of tickets for every performance priced at only £1 for those receiving low income benefits or under the age or 25. Together with our partners, we are committed to making theatre accessible for those across society, breaking down barriers and welcoming in a new generation of theatre-goers.

Linda Crooks, Traverse CEO / Executive Producer, said:

"We live in an era where information is exchanged perpetually, often carelessly, and frequently with malice, across borders and cultures. This August, we are excited to share a tapestry of carefully selected, resonant, global stories from the world of new writing (and reimagined classics through a contemporary lens). Our offer aims to give insights into what that world looks and feels like, from the perspective of a divergent group of storytellers, reflecting the audiences we seek to engage, connect and entertain. We are proud to be presenting a fresh and invigorating programme from artists, both home-grown and international, reflecting the familiar and communal - as well as that which may seem distant to us - but all of which are vital and urgent to connect us together, to care enough to speak truth to power."

Gareth Nicholls, Traverse Artistic Director and director of So Young, said:

"With this year's TravFest we continue our future forward approach, exploring our world together with the artists, communities and audiences that we serve within the Scottish and UK arts landscape. I am inspired by the powerful stories and innovative productions that will take to the Traverse stages, each show offering a vital take on what it means to be human, connecting us to the power of our own actions, as we gather to share in rich and urgent storytelling. I am delighted to be joining this group of artists to direct Douglas Maxwell's 'So Young' as part of TravFest. It is a play with humour, humility and heart, and I am excited to share it with our audiences this August."

When Milo invites his two best friends Davie and Liane around for a takeaway to meet his new girlfriend, it promises to be a great night reconnecting. They delve into the past and swap the same old stories they've been through a thousand times before; the night becomes more about those absent than present. Remembering who they have lost and who they were, or thought they were.

From the celebrated writer of *Decky Does a Bronco* and *I Can Go Anywhere*, and in the vein of *God of Carnage*, Douglas Maxwell's *So Young* sees an innocuous evening slide into ruin as old friends face the challenges of middle age, growing apart and losing those close to them, whether that's to the grave, or to London.

Both touching and funny, So Young is a story about coming back together after time apart.

CYRANO

A joyous, gender-flipped retelling of Cyrano de Bergerac, packed with music, wit and aching romance. A love letter to hope, to overcoming loneliness, to language and desire; to the irrepressible magic of theatre. Cyrano is a big-hearted, irreverent rom-com for our times.

Cyrano is the most interesting person in any room – a wordsmith, a charmer. She works twice as hard and runs twice as fast as the pretty boys, because she's deeply ashamed of something about

herself. Enter Roxanne: brilliant and beautiful, with a penchant for poetry and a way with words, just like Cyrano. But Roxanne only has eyes for Yan: hot, manly Yan; who is dumbstruck around Roxanne. Probably shy, right? Until suddenly he starts saying the most amazing things. But it's not Yan writing these perfect love scenes, it's Cyrano...

Virginia Gay, writer and performer of Cyrano, said:

"Cyrano is someone who's decided they're unworthy of love, believes in the transformative nature of art and poetry, and is a hopeless romantic. You know, it's all of us in our 20s. But so few people remember the original is a tragedy. So, if you've got a queer woman playing and reimagining Cyrano ... well, I don't ever want to be part of something that says queer love is impossible. What does it take to jump the tracks of the narrative and get a hard-won happy ending? Cyrano is about theatre: a writer who writes perfect dialogue for another, a more handsome version of themselves to deliver; the whole worlds we can build with just words and lo-fi-theatre-magic. It's a love letter to live performance and what it can do, and how we can't create this mad, bold, mass-imagining without the audience. We are so excited to bring this feisty, sexy comedy about love, hope and longing to the Edinburgh Fringe."

An Ivy League creative writing professor is captivated by a brilliant, rebellious freshman student. Delicate, provocative, bursting with wit - so begins the story of two outsiders on the threshold of breaking an indelible taboo.

And when the darkest of favours is requested, the stage is set. The Sound Inside drives inexorably towards a climax filled with tension, mystery and the ultimate gesture of love.

Nominated for six Tony Awards, this UK premiere of Adam Rapp's spellbinding play stars Merchant Ivory's Madeleine Potter and The Kite Runner's Eric Sirakian. From director of Psychodrama Matt Wilkinson.

Matt Wilkinson, director of The Sound Inside, said:

"The themes of isolation, loss and grief in Adam's writing speak so powerfully to me. Then there's the mystery, the thriller element. You hope for things to turn out ok. You don't know if they will. Adam's work is never didactic. The Sound Inside is funny as hell, very delicate, totally gripping, but fundamentally I think it's a profound, haunting love story of two people, damaged in their own ways, who reach out to one other, across space, without ever speaking of it."

BATSHIT

'She's off her trolley. Nuttier than a fruitcake. A couple of kangaroos loose in the top paddock'. Women have long been locked up, medicated, pathologized and silenced by a simple label - 'crazy'.

BATSHIT is a wildly theatrical and deeply intimate story of female madness. Created by psycho-siren Leah Shelton (AU) and directed by Olivier award-winning Ursula Martinez (UK), this is a requiem for Leah's grandmother Gwen, who was incarcerated for seeking independence in 1960s Australia. *BATSHIT* draws on personal stories, pop psychology and Prozac-laden humour to explore the myths that keep us compliant and the systems that let us down.

Leah Shelton, writer and performer of BATSHIT, said:

"Through the making of BATSHIT, I've realised how much gaslighting and stereotyping of women as 'crazy' still takes place today - from being disbelieved in a court of law to being told we're imagining our symptoms in the doctor's office - so I think it's fair to say the system is f*cked and it's time for a reboot. Alongside feeling the rage, this is very much a vulnerable show, so I've been lucky to work with the inimitable Ursula Martinez to step outside my comfort zone and blend the autobiographical with the ridiculous."

Four-time Fringe First and Olivier award-winning Fishamble returns to the Traverse.

Explored through the dynamic of a mother-daughter relationship, In Two Minds is deeply personal, inventive, funny and life-affirming. From writer Joanne Ryan (Lustrum Award winner) and director Sarah Jane Scaife (*Beckett sa Chreig: Laethanta Sona*) comes a tale of an adult child and parent sharing the same home. Pom Boyd (*The Dry*) and Karen McCartney (*A Very Old Man with Enormous Wings*) perform a delicate piece grappling with mental health, love and humanity. In Two Minds finds insight in the darkness, humour in the pain, and tenderness in difficult family dynamics.

"Fishamble is always delighted to present its work in the Traverse. We are thrilled to be back in Traverse 2 as part of the Culture Ireland Showcase with IN TWO MINDS, following last year's sell-out

A KNOCK ON THE ROOF

Mariam is preparing for war. She knows that the army often drops small warning bombs on residential buildings in Gaza, giving tenants 5 minutes to evacuate before a rocket comes to demolish their home. So, she decides to train for the possibility of a "Knock on the Roof", frantically (and sometimes quite humorously) practicing how far she can run in 5 minutes, and what she can carry to safety. Mariam is able to find the humour in her dire situation, and shares this with the audience, weaving together the story of her life and family in Gaza.

This timely piece comes to Edinburgh for only 12 performances in advance of a NYC premiere at the renowned Off-Broadway theatre, New York Theatre Workshop, in January 2025.

Khawla Ibraheem, creator of A Knock on the Roof, said:

"Writing and developing this piece began as an intimate collaboration with director Oliver Butler and that collaboration has expanded in such a lovely way as we've assembled a fantastic creative team from Palestine, the United States, and around the world. I can't think of a better place for this piece to premiere than in Edinburgh at TravFest24, where new work and international artistic collaboration truly shine."

Oliver Butler, director and developer of A Knock on the Roof, said:

"It has been a privilege to help tell such a deeply relevant story with Khawla, one of the most creative and collaborative artists I've ever worked with. And while this piece will be in New York City next year, it was a priority for us to reach audiences as soon as possible -- and we feel incredibly lucky to be able to do that at the Traverse Theatre."
